Veterans Home in Bemidji awaiting Federal funding decision

St. Paul, Minn. – The architectural designs are nearing completion, and the Federal funding application has been submitted. Additional details have been provided to decision makers.

Officials from the Minnesota Department of Veterans Affairs visited Bemidji on Thursday to provide an update to the Veterans Home planning task force on the status of the <u>proposed Minnesota Veterans Home in Bemidji</u>.

In 2018, the Minnesota Legislature allocated \$10.2 million toward the cost of the project which will be funded by a combination of federal-granted (65 percent), state-bonded and pending community-provided monies (35 percent). In March of this year, MDVA submitted an application for Federal funds from the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs; that funding will not be confirmed until early 2020.

While Federal funds are not guaranteed, there is continued optimism among the planning team. "The process is on track," said MDVA Commissioner Larry Herke. "We look forward to approval of our Federal funding request and breaking ground on this new Veterans Home next year." If funding is approved in early 2020, the project's tentative timeline includes construction beginning in mid-2020 and the new home opening in early 2022.

The Bemidji Home's design reflects a North woods cabin feel for the public spaces that include a Town Center featuring a small coffee shop/cafe, theater/meeting room, family dining room, meditation room/chapel, and club room. The 72 residential units all have private baths and will be split into two sections and four "neighborhoods," avoiding long institutional-feeling hallways.

While the funding process is moving along, there have been some adjustments in the final design. Increasing construction and labor costs necessitated selecting more economical materials for roofing and countertops and the elimination of some features including a picnic shelter and a maintenance building.

Jim Lucachick, Bemidji Veterans Home Task Force Chair, said the adjustments were consistent with their vision for the project. "We have always said it is OK to be conservative in the design," he said, describing the changes to the plans as "wise decisions and prudent." The task force's priority is to ensure that Veterans are well cared for.

County Veterans Service Officer Scotty Allison noted that he is already getting questions from Veterans wondering when they can apply for residence. Commissioner Herke said that MDVA is not yet accepting applications for residents but will announce that when ready.

Staffing the new home will be a priority as the home's construction is completed. All staff will be State of Minnesota employees who receive competitive pay and generous benefits. About six months prior to opening, hiring will begin for leadership positions with more than 100 other roles filled thereafter.

SPOT LIGHT ON....

Veterans Day is a well-known American holiday, but there are also a few misconceptions about it — like how it's spelled or whom exactly it celebrates. To clear some of that up, here are the important facts you should know.

A lot of people think it's "Veteran's Day" or "Veterans' Day," but they're wrong. The holiday is not a day that "belongs" to one veteran or multiple veterans, which is what an apostrophe implies. It's a day for honoring all veterans — so no apostrophe needed.

Veterans Day is NOT the Same as Memorial Day. A lot of Americans get this confused, and we'll be honest — it can be a little annoying to all of the living veterans out there.

Memorial Day is a time to remember those who gave their lives for our country, particularly in battle or from wounds they suffered in battle. Veterans Day honors all of those who have served the country in war or peace — dead or alive — although it's largely intended to thank living veterans for their sacrifices. It was originally called Armistice Day, commemorating the end of World War I.

World War I officially ended when the Treaty of Versailles was signed on June 28, 1919. However, the fighting ended about seven months before that when the Allies and Germany put into effect an armistice on the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month.

For that reason, Nov. 11, 1918, was largely considered the end of "the war to end all wars" and dubbed Armistice Day. In 1926, Congress officially recognized it as the end of the war, and in 1938, it became an official holiday, primarily a day set aside to honor veterans of World War I.

But then World War II and the Korean War happened, so on June 1, 1954, at the urging of veterans service organizations, Congress amended the commemoration yet again by changing the word "armistice" to "veterans" so the day would honor American veterans of all wars.

Congress signed the Uniform Holiday Bill in 1968 to ensure that a few federal holidays — Veterans Day included — would be celebrated on a Monday. Officials hoped it would spur travel and other family activities over a long weekend, which would stimulate the economy.

For some inexplicable reason, the bill set Veterans Day commemorations for the fourth Monday of every October. On Oct. 25, 1971, the first Veterans Day under this new bill was held. We're not sure why it took three years to implement, but not surprisingly, there was a lot of confusion about the change, and many states were unhappy, choosing to continue to recognize the day as they previously had — in November. The U.S. Army just awarded a contract worth \$162 million to General Dynamics Land Systems to produce remote-controlled robotic mule vehicles to transport heavy combat necessities so small units won't have to carry them into battle.

After months of testing, Army robotic officials selected the GDLS Multi-Utility Tactical Transport (MUTT), which will become the service's Small Multipurpose Equipment Transport (SMET). The Army plans to start fielding it to infantry brigade combat teams (IBCTs) by early fiscal 2021.

GDLS beat out Polaris Industries Inc., Applied Research
Associates Inc. (ARA) and Neya
Systems LLC's MRZR X; HDT
Global Hunter's WOLF; and
Howe and Howe Technologies
Inc.'s Grizzly in an operational
test demonstration last November run by the Army's Maneuver
Capabilities Development and
Integration Directorate
(MCDID) at Fort Benning,
Georgia.

"The MUTT did very well in the [test demonstration]; it was the clear favorite among the soldiers," Lt. Col. Rob Brown, the military deputy of the Robotics Requirements Division at MCDID, told Military.com. "GD did a really good job with their system."
